GEN PETER W. CHIARELLI

Chief Executive Officer of One Mind and Former Army Vice Chief of Staff

General Peter Chiarelli, USA-Ret., was appointed the Chief Executive Officer of ONE MIND in 2012. He is a retired General with almost 40 years of experience. As the 32nd Army Vice Chief of Staff, Chiarelli was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Army and its 1.1 million active and reserve Soldiers. This included the oversight of many of the Army's R&D programs, and the implementation of recommendations related to its behavioral health programs, specifically its Health Promotion, Risk Reduction and Suicide Prevention Program.

In 2013, Chiarelli received the Patriot Award, the Congressional Medal of Honor Society's highest honor for his dedication and ongoing efforts to help Soldiers, civilians and families suffering from the invisible wounds of war.

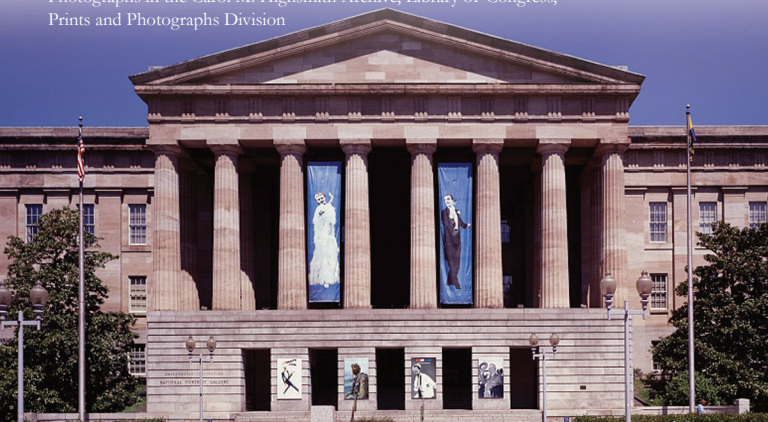

Mr. Ward is the curator of the exhibit *One Life: Grant and Lee: "It is well that war is so terrible. . ."* This special installation considers two lives that were intertwined during the Civil War. The rivalry between generals Ulysses S. Grant and Robert E. Lee is one of the most memorable in American military history. In the way that each embodied the society for which they fought; their clash became a harbinger of the evolution of warfare in the 20th century.

As the Civil War Sesquicentennial comes to a close in 2015, the Army Historical Foundation is commemorating the Civil War at this year's Annual Meeting. The Civil War was the bloodiest event in American history, an event so significant that it helped define our country and tested our fortitude as a nation.

The Civil War ended 150 years ago in the spring of 1865.

- 9 April - Robert E. Lee's surrenders to Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Court House
- 14 April - Abraham Lincoln is shot at Ford's Theater and dies the following day
- 13 May - Last battle of the war fought at Palmito Ranch, TX

The National Portrait Gallery is taking part in the commemorations for the 150th anniversary of the Civil War and the presidency of Abraham Lincoln with a series of exhibitions. Even though the National Portrait Gallery originally served as a patent office in 1840, during the Civil War, the building was used as a temporary barracks, and then was converted into a hospital and morgue following the battles of Manassas, Antietam and Fredericksburg.
