

# The Army Historical Foundation Gallery Recognition Opportunities



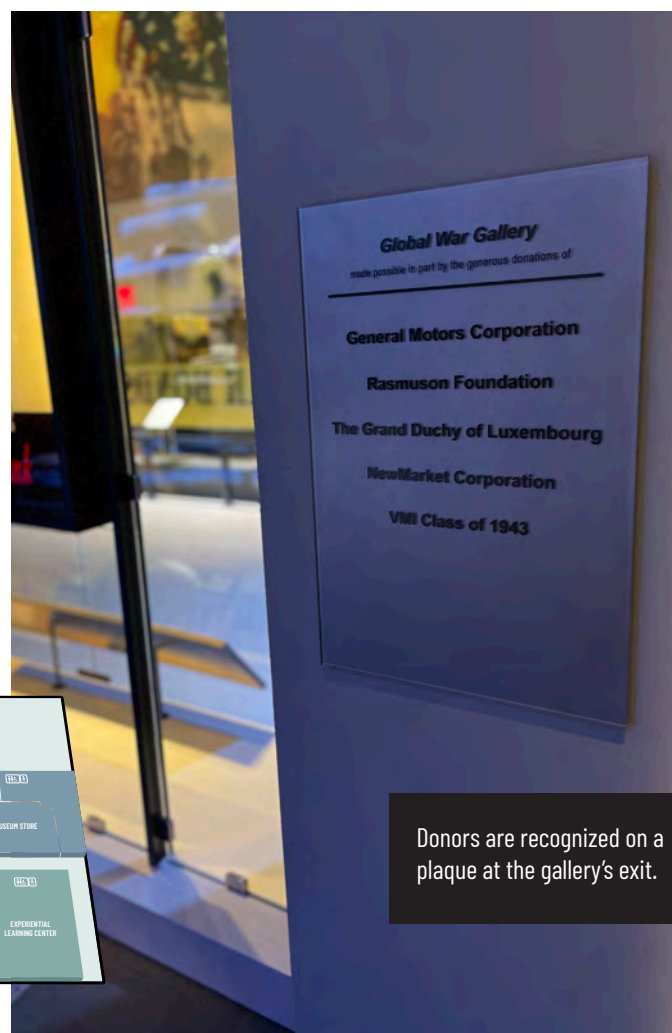
## GLOBAL WAR GALLERY

Circles of Distinction donors who pledge \$150,000 and up have the opportunity to support a gallery, exhibit, or item within the National Museum of the United States Army. This is an opportunity to connect with a meaningful piece of Army history within the Museum and help The Army Historical Foundation reach their campaign goals. Recognition opportunities start at \$150,000 for items like our Soldiers' Stories Kiosks, \$250,000 and up for exhibit areas, and \$5,000,000 for the entire gallery. Donation amount is related to size and significance of the exhibit or item you are supporting.

## GLOBAL WAR GALLERY

The *Global War Gallery* is located off the Army Concourse. Here visitors learn of the Army's role in the Allied victory during World War II and explore both the European and Pacific Theater.

## GLOBAL WAR GALLERY (1919-1945)

The *Global War Gallery* portrays the Army's role in the Allied victory during World War II. Visitors learn about both the European and Pacific Theaters, the technology of the conflict, the Army's air war, and the development of the atomic bomb.

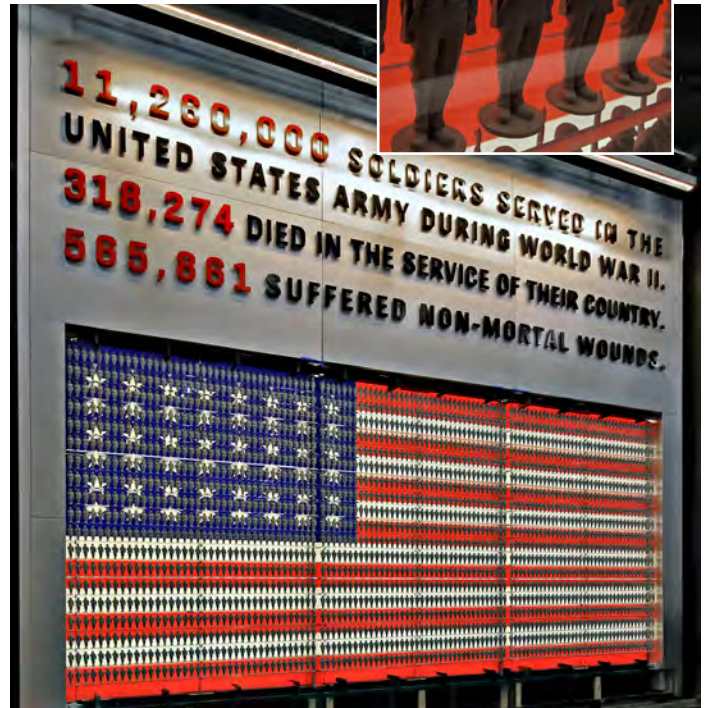


The Higgins assault boat (left), known officially as a Landing Craft, Vehicle, Personnel (LCVP), landed more Allied troops on beaches in Europe and the Pacific than all other types of landing craft combined. Designed by Louisiana boat builder Andrew Higgins, these small boats could carry 36 combat-loaded troops, or a jeep and 12 men.

11,260,000 Soldiers served in the United States Army during World War II. 318,274 died in the service of their country. 565,861 suffered non-mortal wounds. The Massive Effort (right) highlights the number of Soldiers who served during WWII. Each miniature soldier represents 5,000 Soldiers.



A 3D globe tells the story of the global battlefield of World War II. Start with a silent "global timeline" of World War II, from Germany's 1939 invasion of Poland through the end of the war in 1945. Then, watch a video projected onto the globe to see an overview of the war from the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941 to victory over Japan in August 1945.
